

What would spring-time be without a story about Walter Joost chasing down turkeys? I know its spring when the phone rings in early March and its Walter on the other end. "You want to do some turkey scouting this weekend?" Walter asks.

Last year he was the first turkey hunter to harvest three mature Toms in the same spring. This year with his crossbow out of the repair shop, he set out to do the same with his bow. How did he fair? We will get to that later.

Now, how is Walter so successful you ask? Is he a great caller? No way!!! He can do the basics (cluck, purr, yelp) on the peg and pot calls just good enough to be dangerous! How about the mouth call? Yeah gads! I tell him to put that wounded goose back in it's cage! If he's not a champion caller, what makes him so lethal???

The answer; Walter is a student of the land and a scholar of turkey habits. He knows where they want to go before they do! And he knows how they are going to get there. Many hours of turkey hunting seminars and days a field have given him this ultimate edge. Combine this knowledge and his drive and perseverance to succeed (some call it stubbornness) and you have the perfect predator. If we could only get him to learn how to call! Well, maybe not, that just wouldn't be fair!

Now, how did Walter do this spring? As I said earlier, Walter had his bow back from the repair shop and was determined to harvest the Wisconsin Slam (3 Turkeys) with his bow. He meticulously sighted in his bow. His arrows tipped with the new head chopping Magnus BullHead broadhead. It would be head shots only for Walter. He was ready.

His next permit was for the 5th period also in SE WI. Walter nailed another turkey with a 10 yard shot. The Jake fell in it's tracks as the Magnus BullHead all but cut off the turkey's head. Bird #2 of the bow slam was complete.

What are the odds of shooting two bearded hens in three years? Obviously pretty good if you have an awesome guide like Mike Gustin. Two years ago. Mike guided me out for the spring turkey hunt at the Badger Ammunition Plant and I was fortunate enough to shoot my first turkey ever. It happened to be a bearded hen. Last year, Mike couldn't guide me and I didn't have any luck that season. Now this spring once again Mike was able to take Kurt Christensen and I out at Badger. We set up right next to each other, with Mike and Kurt in one ground blind and myself in the other. At about 7:30 am, a bearded hen and three other hens came over top of the hill in front of Kurt, but unfortunately Kurt wasn't able to get a shot off. Then they came over in front of my blind so Mike told me to shoot. I dropped the bearded hen at twenty-seven yards and the pressure was off. I really appreciate Mike and all the other great volunteer guides that Adaptive Sportsmen provides and would like to give thanks to Adaptive Sportsmen for the opportunity to participate in these fun events that they hold. So if anyone has an interest in having a chance to take a bearded hen, then Mike Gustin is the guide for you! Thanks, John Martinson.



You Know Its Spring When:

You see, Walter starts his turkey scouting in Mid-March and doesn't stop until the last day of the hunt. In four short years of turkey hunting, Walter has become one of the most accomplished spring turkey hunters in the state of Wisconsin, home of the toughest turkeys in the nation to kill.

Walter's first permit was for the 4th period in SE WI. He was successful harvesting a Jake with a 24 yard shot to the head, dropping the bird instantly. First bird of the bow slam accomplished.

The third and final leg of the bow slam put Walter in the 6th period hunting in SW WI. Walter had several encounters with gobblers (some close, some far) but was not able to get a shot for one reason or another. "Close enough for BBs but not for a broadhead!" Walter did finally get a shot. It was about 40 yards. Shooting at the head, Walter aimed and let the arrow fly. The arrow flew harmlessly by the turkey, as night fell and the hunting season came to a close.
