When came over he went to where the buck went down and said it was a twelve pointer! That is my biggest buck for sure. I was so happy I just sat by that outhouse and soaked it all in for a while. Of course we had to call it the "Outhouse Buck".

MY FIRST TOM TURKEY by Charlie Ande

Last year **Dan Spindler** guided and called for me on my last day of the season. He called seven jakes to come within range; I got one. It was very exciting. The story about how I got my first turkey, a Jake, was in the June 2006 newsletter and is on the web page.

This year I heard about a farmer in Wausau with crop damage tags he was saving for the disabled. **Wayne Krueger** was wonderful in working with the farmer to get the tags and setting up the hunt for me. He guided and called for me during the second season. Wayne took me to a corner of a grass field with a row of pines around it. I sat in a camouflaged converted golf cart with camouflage cloth around it and Wayne nearby. We heard what sounded like a bobcat scream and then we heard coyotes howling. It was eerie.

We could hear and see turkeys in the pine trees just over our heads. Soon the toms started to gobble. Wayne had placed a tom decoy about 15 yards from the cart. After the toms flew down and started to gobble, Wayne began using his slate to call back. I noticed four turkeys about 150 yards away walking into the grass field. I could see all four birds starting to strut. Wayne kept calling, and toms behind us were answering. It sounded as though Wayne and the toms had a regular conversation going.

Three of the four toms started strutting towards us but would stop and turn around. This went on for about 15 minutes. Suddenly there was the sound of wings flapping and a hen that was perched overhead in the pine tree, flew down. "What luck," I thought. She slowly walked across the field, looking this way and that. The three toms turned to take a look, but did not follow. They started coming towards Wayne's calling and the fourth tom starting walking with the other three in the direction of my blind. They got about 100 yards away and then another hen flew down to them. Two of the toms tried to breed her. She started walking across the field away from us and the toms started to follow her. With an expert hand, Wayne started his slate calling. The toms stopped and looked our way (after all, two hens had flown down from the pine tree, perhaps there is another hen).

The second hen started talking and the toms started following her again. Wayne did more calling, and they stopped and turned toward my blind. She started talking and they turned to her, Wayne called and they turned to us. This went on for about four or five times. Finally the toms let the hen go and she walked away. The toms were now coming our way!

My anticipation created a very long time watching the toms, but it was probably 15 minutes. I was getting very anxious. When they got closer, but still quite far away, they looked at the tom decoy and instead of coming in they started to veer off. If I was going to take a shot, I had better do it now.

I aimed at the neck of the last turkey and pulled the trigger, with a loud blast, "BOOM." He went down!!! I shot two more times to make sure he was hit. One of the other toms got on top of him and started to peck at him. Wayne whispered loudly, "RELOAD." Wayne had been so far back in the dark pine grove that he didn't see the four toms when they came in. All he saw were the two flying off after I made my shot.

My first tom was 19 lbs. with a 9" beard. I am so glad I got the chance to go on this hunt. I want to thank **Randy Krueger** for donating his crop damage tags to the disabled. Thank you, Randy and Wayne for something I will always remember.
